Dear friends,

As is the case every year, this past year 2011 has been a time of blessings, growth and new challenges. Above all, we thank God for continued good health for all the members of our family and for providing us with all that is necessary to work and study.

Our daughter Elizabeth and her husband Matt made the biggest move of the year, leaving

Columbus, Ohio in August for Elizabeth to begin a PhD program in Statistics Education at the University of Minnesota in Minneapolis. When Matt informed his boss at his engineering job in Columbus that he would be moving, his boss immediately surprised him by asking him if he would be willing to continue to work with the company from home in Minneapolis. In September, she accepted a full-time position teaching first-grade in English at an elementary school. That has meant keeping very busy, of course, but things have gone well.

In addition to his normal teaching duties at the Theological Community of Mexico and Augsburg Lutheran Seminary, David was asked to serve as coordinator for the Seminary's new online course program. David also spent 6 months helping San Pedro Lutheran Church in Mexico City develop their worship program, and in August was chosen to serve as Chair of the Steering Committee of the ELCA Association of Teaching Theologians. All of this has kept him busy.
